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The Season of Ordinations

At this time of year we pray for all across the country being ordained deacon or priest, especially remembering Sister Teresa and Lisa Price, both being ordained deacon this Sunday.

What are the origins of the ordained ministry as we now have it? The Acts of the Apostles tells us that James, the brother of our Lord, and leader of the Church in Jerusalem, gathered around him the remaining apostles of Christ, and added to them further leaders, or elders (Greek: presbyteroi, which later would be shortened to the English word 'priest.'). Seven deacons were added (Greek: diakonos, servant). But it is notable that at least two deacons, Stephen and Philip, carried out evangelistic missions of their own, the former becoming the first Christian martyr. So they were a great deal more than simply servants at the table! (Acts 6:2). As some of the presbyters became more prominent, they are referred to in the New Testament as overseers (episcopos, bishop).

Deacons were originally permanently in the diaconate. But by the Middle Ages the diaconate had become simply a probationary period leading up to the priesthood. The disappearance of permanent deacons has perhaps been a loss to the Church. It has been suggested, for example, that Lay Ministers (or Lay Readers) could form a new Order of permanent deacons.

It is clear in the NT that these ministries of service and leadership in the Church were often interchangeable: for example, St Paul in Acts 20 speaks to a group of presbyters whom he also refers to as overseers (bishops). He regarded himself as an apostle but also refers to himself as servant/deacon (2 Corinthians 3:6 & 6:4). So, although the threefold ministry that we have now certainly has its roots in the NT, it was only as local churches became more settled that it reached its present fixed form, by around 200 CE, earlier in some places.

The ordination Services (the 'Ordinal') make clear in powerful words what would be deacons and priests are being called to: deacons are 'to work with their fellow (church) members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible.' Priests are to be 'servants and shepherds....they are to proclaim the word of the Lord and to watch for signs of God's new creation....messengers, watchmen, and stewards of the Lord....to teach....to feed and provide for the Lord's family..... They are to call them to repentance and to declare in Christ's name the absolution and forgiveness of their sins. With all God's people, they are to tell the story of God's love. They are to preside at the Lord's table.' (For the full texts, see the C of E website and search 'ordination.').

Of course the entirety of what the ordained person is called to is beyond the ability and capacity of any individual and the words of the Ordinal are actually reminding us of the vocation of the *whole* Church. And they will always need to be practised and interpreted in the light of any congregation's particular context and circumstances.


Some Christian traditions are uncomfortable about using the word 'priest' and prefer to revert to the NT word presbyter or elder, or to use something like 'Minister.' They want to make clear that there is only one priest, Jesus Christ, the one mediator between God and humankind, whose sacrifice on the Cross, as the Gospels put it, caused the curtain of the Temple to be torn in two (Matthew 27:51) - that is to say, on the Cross the gulf between God and humanity is destroyed. It is the whole Church that as the Body of Christ shares in the one Priesthood of Jesus Christ: 'Let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood. ' (1 Peter 2:5). So it is that the bishop introduces the Ordination Service with the words, 'God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation.'

So why is it appropriate to stick with the word priest for those whom the New Testament calls presbyter? It is because this rich word is a constant reminder to all of us of the Church's vocation to adhere to the

priesthood of our Lord, to live out together the priesthood of all believers, to draw people to God's love, given to us in Jesus Christ. The word 'priest' constantly recalls the ordained person to her or his responsibility to enable, encourage, lead, strengthen, represent, inspire, and deepen the priesthood of the whole church.

The lighting in the Sacristy.




In the next few weeks electricians from Anthony J.Smith will be working in the church and sacristy to complete the lighting upgrade.
