

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#### **Scripture and Prayer**

#### **The Lent Gospels**

Lectio Divina is an intentional and contemplative way of reading scripture. Established within Benedictine monastic practice in the 6<sup>th</sup> century and providing us with a way to step more deeply into God's word. The term means 'divine reading' and is based in the belief that Christ is present in the Bible and that this way of reading allows God to speak directly to us.




The focus of our attention will be on the Gospel reading of the following Sunday, following the theme set by the lectionary but allowing us to directly hear God's word across this season

Each reading session will last for just over 30 minutes and will take place in the Richard Chapel at 3.00pm on a Wednesday:

21 February; 28 February; 6 March; 13 March

Tarry Awhile: Wisdom from Black Spirituality for People of Faith



Tarry Awhile, is the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book for 2024.

'Tarry here and watch with me . . .' (Matt 26.38, KJV)

**Tarrying** is a Black Christian spiritual practice in which believers actively wait to experience the manifestation of God's presence. It answers yes to the question Jesus once asked his disciples: will you tarry here and watch with me? Whether in the vibrancy of music and singing, or in the hushed silence of the congregation, people of all ages anticipate an encounter with God that will transform what they know, feel and experience day to day.

This book makes the wisdom of Black spiritualities and faith available for all people. It focuses on seven themes: darkness as a place of encounter with the divine; the unity of all things; movement, belonging and migration; the Spirit as one who moves in unexpected ways; quiet contemplation as essential to spiritual growth; healing in community; and weeping that turns to joy.

#### Watch and Pray: Wisdom and hope for Lent and life

**Watch and Pray** is the Lent Theme structured to cover the Season of Lent. It is available as a reflection booklet and also via emails or delivered free to your 'smart speaker'. The booklet will be on sale at church (£2.00 a copy) and instructions for digital ways of connecting with this programme.



Watch and Pray invites us all to wait expectantly for God to meet us and sustain us through the storms and trials we all face. It 'challenges us to seek God in both familiar and unfamiliar places: in darkness and in quiet; in movement and migration; in the healing and transforming work of the Spirit; in the weeping of Holy Week and in the joy of Easter morning' (++Justin).

This Lent we are encouraged to draw on the wisdom of Black Spirituality, particularly the practice of "tarrying" (waiting) as a community to draw closer to Jesus and to each other.

The booklet for adults offers a daily Bible verse, a short reflection, an idea for 'watching', and a prayer. It invites us to seek God in both familiar and unfamiliar places this Lent: in darkness and in quiet; in movement and migration; in the healing and transforming work of the Spirit; in the weeping of Holy Week and in the joy of Easter morning.

#### Post Christmas Appeal - Julian Trust

Over the extended Christmas Period we have all been exposed to many many appeals from various and very worthwhile charities.

The Julian Trust offers on four evenings and nights every week, a hot supper for on an average of 60 - 70 members of the Homeless Society

In addition there are 12 beds for overnights guests. The service also offers showering facilities, change of clothes, washing of clothes, breakfast, closing at 7.30 a.m.

What we need are Volunteers for evenings and overnight services. This is to enable us to open for a 5th night per week (this we did pre Covid).

If you might be interested or know someone who might be interested, <u>please speak to me in the first place</u>.


At Church any of the clergy or wardens will point me out (if you don't know me) OR telephone me.



The Julian Trust are looking for knitters to transform donated wool into hats, gloves and scarves for winter wear.


