The Acts of the Apostles

A Summary:

The book of Acts gives the history of the Christian church and the spread of the gospel of Jesus Christ, as well as the mounting opposition to it. It was probably written in Rome between 70 and 90 CE.

Although many faithful servants were used to preach and teach the gospel of Jesus Christ, Saul, also called Paul, was the most influential. Before he was converted, Paul zealously persecuted Christians. Paul's dramatic conversion on the Damascus Road (Acts 9:1-31) is a highlight of the book of Acts. After his conversion he went to the opposite extreme of loving God and preaching His Word with power and fervency in the Spirit of the true and living God. The disciples were empowered by the Holy Spirit to be His witnesses in Jerusalem (Acts 1 to 8:3, in Judea and Samaria (8:4—12:25), and to the ends of the earth (13:1—28:31). Included in the last section are Paul's three missionary journeys (13:1—21:16), his trials in Jerusalem and Caesarea (21:17—26:32) and his journey to Rome (27:1—28:31) – the acknowledged centre of the gentile world.

The central theme the spread of Christianity to the gentile world under the guiding inspiration of the Holy Spirit. The author also describes the church's gradual drawing away from Jewish traditions.

Why is it important today?:

The Book of Acts is vital not only for its vivid historical record, but also for the inspiration which it brings to us now. Today's church can seek to recapture something of the early confidence, enthusiasm, vision and power of the church of the first century. Despite all its imperfections and troubles, the young church clearly had been overwhelmed by the Holy Spirit, who thrust it out to witness.

The experiences of the early church have lots to say about issues that concern Christians today. What can Acts tell us about extraordinary manifestations of the Spirit? How should churches structure themselves - with elders, deacons, pastors or all three? And, of course, how should the church reach out into a lost world, with the glorious message of salvation?

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Early Worship Focus on the Acts of the Apostles:

Over the last month the Early Worship focus has been on the Book of Acts, and in particular the missionary journeys of Paul. This will be followed with the next episode which will focus on the 'Apostles and the Epistles'. Without the 'Acts of the Apostles' we would not be in a position to fully understand the Epistles of Paul – and others.

Further Reading – Two Novels and some Theology:

Two Novels: For those who would like to know a little more there are two novels (yes, novels) written by the British theologian and Anglican Lay Reader Paula Gooder. Paula completed her DPhil at Queens College Oxford, taught at Ripon College, Cuddesdon and the Queen's Foundation and has been Director of Mission, Learning and Development.

Phoebe: A Story. Sometime around 56 AD, the apostle Paul wrote to the church in Rome. His letter was arguably his theological masterpiece, and has continued to shape Christian faith ever since. He entrusted this letter to Phoebe, the deacon of the church at Cenchreae; in writing to the church that almost surely met in her home, Paul refers to her both as a deacon and as a helper or patron of many. But who was this remarkable woman? In this, her first work of fiction, Biblical scholar and popular author and speaker Paula Gooder tells Phoebe's story — who she was, the life she lived and her first-century faith — and in doing so opens up Paul's theology, giving a sense of the cultural and historical pressures that shaped Paul's thinking, and the faith of the early church.

Lydia: A Story. The New Testament tells us very little about Lydia, a seller of purple cloth who was living in Philippi when she met the apostle Paul on his second missionary journey. And yet she is considered the first recorded convert to Christianity in Europe. In her second work of fiction, Biblical scholar and popular author and speaker Paula Gooder tells Lydia's story - who she was, the life she lived and her first-century faith - and in doing so opens up Paul's letter to the Philippians, giving a sense of the cultural and historical pressures that shaped Paul's thinking, and the faith of the early church. Written in the gripping style of Gerd Theissen's The Shadow of the Galilean, and similarly rigorously researched, this is a book for everyone and anyone who wants to engage more deeply and imaginatively with Paul's theology.

Some Theology: Willie James Jennings is Professor of Systematic Theology at Yale. He is a powerful writer of accessible theological material. He presents a powerful challenge to Christians to reexamine their assumptions, confront their complicity, and seek a more inclusive and transformative Christian imagination that breaks free from the constraints of colonialism and fosters a vision of God's kingdom characterized by justice, love, and flourishing for all

(Belief: A Theological Commentary on the Bible) Acts: This new commentary for the Belief series, award-winning author and theologian Willie James Jennings explores the relevance of the book of Acts for the struggles of today. While some see Acts as the story of the founding of the Christian church, Jennings argues that it is so much more, depicting revolution--life in the disrupting presence of the Spirit of God. According to Jennings, Acts is like Genesis, revealing a God who is moving over the land, "putting into place a holy repetition that speaks of the willingness of God to invade our every day and our every moment." He reminds us that Acts took place in a time of Empire, when the people were caught between diaspora Israel and the Empire of Rome. The spirit of God intervened, offering new life to both. Jennings shows that Acts teaches how people of faith can yield to the Spirit to overcome the divisions of our present world.

The Annual DAC Conference 2023 'The Importance of Welcome'

In every Diocese the DAC carries out an important role. Guidance and permission for these fabric changes are give on the basis of:

- * Alignment with missional priorities of specific church in given context
- ★ Support and enrichment of worship
- * Enabling greater inclusivity and access
- * Extent to which improvement will achieve net-zero carbon objectives
- * Degree to which 'church buildings' become more accessible to the local and wider community
- **★** Development of partnered opportunities with other churches and organizations

Our next Walk is on Saturday 9 September


Meet at ASC for a prompt 10.45 start.


