



A Palm Sunday Reflection

Two Liturgies

This Sunday, Palm Sunday, starts with the Liturgy of the Palms and then moves, in one step, to the Liturgy of the Passion. Historically, these have been two separate liturgies taking place on the one day.



Over time, these two different commemorations merged into one, and in some places the re-enactment of the 'Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem' took over in importance. Some communities have made this the main theme of the Day's liturgy and omitted the Passion reading altogether. We should be remembered, however, that it is not the entry into Jerusalem, but rather the Passion Reading that sets the major theme for the whole week (as is recognised in the *Book of Common Prayer BCP*). It's interesting to note that in the *BCP* of 1549 and 1662 there was no mention of any Palm Liturgy, and that this Sunday was refered to as 'Sunday next before Easter'.

However, recognising that these two liturgies have merged into one event and that the focus is the Passion reading we should also remind oursleves of the change in tone. The transition between these two liturgical parts creates a significant shift in the tone and mood of the service, from the celebration of Jesus' arrival to the somber reflection on his sacrifice.

Focus on the Passion

(John van de Laar, Methodist and author, of 'The Hour that Changes Everything', explores this focus)

'The Liturgy of the Passion is, quite simply, a meditation on the suffering of Jesus. But, in the Psalm reading, we are also invited to reflect on God's solidarity with all who suffer, in the Epistle, we are called to view Christ's passion as an example for us to follow. In addition, two particular narratives stand out in the Lukan account of Christ's passion.

Firstly, Luke places the dispute over who is the greatest here, at the Last Supper, which, when placed alongside the Philippians reading, drives home the servant nature of Jesus' death, and the call for us to embrace the same self-giving life.

Secondly, only Luke includes the account of the penitent thief on the cross who asks Jesus to remember him. The response of Christ to this man, in the midst of his own suffering and persecution, demonstrates very dramatically, the extent to which the loving, serving grace of Christ reaches, and the extent to which we are called to serve and love others in Christ's name.

In the light of this, the Liturgy of the Passion, this year, invites us into a deep and transforming journey into Christ's suffering, Christ's presence in our suffering, and Christ's call for us to share his suffering. It's not just about the passion of the Christ – it's about the passion of the Christ as well!

The clear, comforting message of God's initiative in coming to us in our pain — whatever that pain may be — comes through very clearly in the Passion narrative and accompanying Scriptures this year. For many who have experienced suffering, or been shocked by some of the world's tragic and horrific events, this comforting word can be deeply healing. In addition the call to participate in this comforting, healing work of God can be both challenge and inspiration, and can motivate people to engage more intentionally in the suffering of their families, neighbourhoods and communities. Much of this work can be done, though, with little more than a meditative, mindful encounter with the Scriptures.

If the Liturgy of the Passion is combined with the Liturgy of the Palms, there is the additional challenge to recognise that God's Reign seeks to subvert the systems of our world that cause or exacerbate suffering. Once again, the Passion on which we meditate is not just that of Jesus, but of ourselves.'








Stations of the Cross

Flower Gifts at Easter



Several flowers are traditionally associated with Easter, having acquired symbolic meaning over the years.

Easter lilies: Easter lilies, with their large white trumpet-shaped blooms and lovely fragrance, are the most well-known flower used at Easter. There are many meanings associated with this flower: for example, the white hue represents Jesus's purity, and the shape of the trumpet recalls the trumpet of the angel Gabriel. Also, the flower grows from a bulb buried in the ground, which is considered symbolic of Christ's resurrection.

If you would like to contribute towards Lilies for Easter, please sign the notice in the Porch. This year lilies are £2.50 each

If you are contributing in memory of a loved one this will be acknowledged in the Easter news letter. Lilies will be used in the floral arrangements around the church.


The All Saints Flower Team are having a craft session on Saturday 12th from 10.30 am making fun things for Easter.




