All Saints' and All Souls'

From the early centuries of Christianity, November 1 and 2 have been observed as days to remember the dead. This remembrance most likely originated in Celtic lands where this time of year marks the beginning of death in nature. By the 5th century (in the Common Era) in Rome, a festival was created for all the saints. This originated with Pope Boniface IV and took place on May 13 and was moved to November 1 by Pope Gregory III (in the 8th century). The festival was celebrated in the Pantheon, a Roman temple dedicated to all the pagan gods. However, this festival transformed the Pantheon from a pagan temple to a Christian church.

These two days, All Saints' and All Souls', are inexorably linked.



More recently, November 1 has been identified as a day to remind the Christian faithful that they are in communion with all who have gone before them in particular those who have *lived holy lives* yet may or may have been canonized as saints. This is All Saints' Day.

But, of course, this leaves out a great number of 'others', who might not be categorised as Holy People. Consequently, November 2 became a day more focused on *all the dead*, ordinary people, hence called All Souls' Day.

All over Europe and in South America these two days are celebrated with visits to the cemeteries and by special commemorations in church to remember the dead. All Saints Day is marked by the Catholic Church as a special feast day.

In many churches, it is customary to have a "book of remembrance" in which people write the names of their loved ones to be prayed for especially all during November.

Did you know...

We have a reproduction of a Renaissance masterpiece here in All Saints?

This painting hangs above the Altar in our Lady Chapel. It shows Our Lady on a pedestal, holding the infant Jesus. She is supported by two putti and flanked by Saint Francis (or possibly St Bonaventure) and Saint John the Evangelist.

It is a reproduction of a painting by the High Renaissance artist Andrea del Sarto (1486 - 1530) and is probably his best known work.

Painted in 1517 as an altarpiece for the church of the convent and hospital of San Francesco dei Macci in Florence, the original is now in the Uffizi Gallery in Florence.

The painting is known as the Madonna of the Harpies, a title which refers to the two carved creatures on either side of the pedestal upon which Our Lady stands. However, some modern art historians now believe that these creatures represent the locusts described in the Book of Revelation. Whichever is the case, according to the Uffizi, they represent the forces of evil being trampled upon by the Virgin.

Our reproduction, in a gilt plaster frame, is fixed firmly to the wall, so it is unfortunately not possible to discover any clues as to its provenance. If anyone does have any information, I would be delighted if they could let me know.


