### **Living Advent whilst Celebrating Christmas**

This weekend we move from one part of the Season of Advent to the other, and the Church gives us the treat of Gaudete Sunday. Named such from the first word of the Introit or Entrance Antiphon for the Mass of the day, 'Gaudete in Domino semper' (Rejoice in the Lord always) which originates in St. Paul's exhortation to the Philippians 4:4-5.



The intention is for the 'Church' to give her 'children' a bit of a respite from the traditional drabness of Advent by allowing us to feast our eyes on altar flowers and rose vestments and by giving our ears the pleasure of organ music.

Gaudete Sunday also emphasises the tension, experience by Christians, between living Advent whilst celebrating Christmas.

When we are asked about the meaning of Advent, we recognise that it is partly concerned with the coming of Jesus as the Babe of Bethlehem. Yet we know that Advent directs our attention to three comings of Christ:

- The first half of the season looks toward His glorious Second Advent as Judge of the Universe, ushering in the Kingdom of His Father in all its fullness,
- ★ The second half is focused on His historical coming in the mystery of the Incarnation.
- **★** There is another coming, however, one which links the other two and that is His coming among us continually, especially through the sacraments.

In other words, as we look back on His coming as Man and look forward to His coming as Judge, we experience His presence in veiled and sacramental ways. The sacraments prolong or continue His Incarnation, making available to us the benefits of that saving event and giving us the strength we need to look forward to His final appearance with joy and confidence, rather than fear and trembling

For most the significance of Advent is lost under the spreading season of Christmas. This has happened for all sorts of understandable reasons: retail outlets have opportunity for increased sales; schools would not be happy with Nativity plays after Christmas Day; and then on to office parties, Christmas carols and all the media coverage telling exactly what we must do in the Christmas countdown to truly enjoy Christmas.



So, what might we do to remind us that it is the Advent Season, even under the spreading Christmas festivities?

Here are five suggestions – and it's no too late:

- ➤ **Use Advent wisely** If Advent is about preparation select something to read or take on a different prayer cycle.
- Make an **Advent Wreath for the home** light the candles on the wreath and reflect on the meaning whilst also burning the 'count-down' Advent Candle.
- Attend the All Saints Advent Carol Service and the Fourth Sunday Service of Lessons and Carols.
- \* Advocate in the Public Space as we will be judged at the Second Coming, ensure that we speak out about and support charities and organizations concerned with justice, equality, righteousness and care of creation.
- **Keep the Liturgical Seasons** Advent as best we can! But especially Christmas until the end of the Christmas Season (Baptism of Christ on the 11 January).

In the name of your fleshed *kairos*. Amen.




The Christmas Wreath workshops on Saturday the 6<sup>th</sup> and Monday 8<sup>th</sup> were well attended and great fun.

The magnificent work on the All Saints robes, lead by Janet and Anne from Bristol Cathedral Embroidery Group, has achieved a huge amount in a very short time.




