Sisters Angela, Valerie, Dorothea & Caroline Anne were the first Sisters to live at 82 Ashley Road. Arriving 8th December 1991 and being blessed into the area 25th January 1992.

Once upon a time, many years ago, a local Priest approached the Community of the Sisters of the Church to see if they would be interested in setting up a house in his parish, with the approval of the Diocese I might add. Before this encounter, there had been some civil unrest in the area, the St Paul's Riots.

*"The St Pauls riot occurred in St Pauls, Bristol, England on 2 April 1980 when police raided the Black and White Café on Grosvenor Road in the heart of the area. After several hours of disturbance in which fire engines and police cars were damaged, 130 people were arrested, 25 were taken to hospital, including 19 police and members of the press..."*

*Relations between police and the local community remained tense and reached a low point in 1986 when 600 police raided the Black and White Café again in an action named Operation Delivery. It took intervention by local Member of Parliament William Waldegrave to persuade the police to scale down their policy of containment."*



We, the Sisters, were invited to be a praying presence in the area, a role we willingly took up. The ministry in the early days began organically, and out of this 'being' approach we have since established the Loaves and Fishes Project. The Sisters have also been involved with working children and were involved with the setting up of the 125 Project (an organisation which supports women who are working on the streets). We have always been available to preach into local parishes and also speak at a variety of group settings.



The Garden, then and now

Behind all the ministries that have been part of our life at "82", prayer has been the constant. Having a Sister who is a Priest has meant that we are now able to offer the Eucharist more often. Our regular service is at 1:30pm on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, each week our Foodbank is open - all are welcome. We have mirrored the early days of our presence by having a Eucharist in our yard - you'll see from the photo of our garden that we would have them in the garden on occasions.

And now... we are entering a new phase in our life at "82". A few years ago, we employed someone to help with the running of the Loaves and Fishes, and now we are in the position to employ another person. The number of Sisters present at the house has decreased, with age and availability being a key factor. This has resulted in needing to 'outsource' the day to day running of the project, with the Sisters then able to focus on pastoral support, fundraising and most importantly, Prayer.

The Sisters were in Bristol at the beginning of the 20th Century, moving to Alma Vale Road in 1921, having moved from a house in Colston Street. In those days, the Sisters helped in the Sacristy of All Saints.

After the Church was bombed, the Parish held Eucharists in the Sisters chapel, until other arrangements were made.

We left Bristol in 1945 and on our return, now living in the St Paul's area, we were part of another parish. In 2016, we reconnected with All Saints, and have felt part of this wonderful community ever since.

If you have any suggestions as to which (two) charities the PCC should choose to adopt this year please email the ideas to Fr Charles, Wendy in the office or one of the Wardens.


## Stewardship Campaign


